## VE Day REMEMBERED

In the last issue, we asked for your remembrances of the day you heard that the War in Europe was ended. Here are the three we received.

Joan Marsh

I was twelve, almost thirteen on May 8<sup>th</sup> 1945. I had just started at Dudley Girls High School, proudly walking home in my second hand uniform. Unexpectedly the "all clear" siren came on and on! People were visibly confused, there had been no siren warning of an imminent raid. "What's going on", I heard many say. Suddenly, frightened, I felt a firm hand grasp my satchel and turned to see a smiling policeman. "It's Joan isn't it he enquired? Your dad asked me to tell you he's had news from headquarters that the war in Europe is over, and we won". I had difficulty in holding back a scream of joy as he continued "tell your mum he'll be late home". My first selfish reaction was one of relief for myself. I would not have to pump air into the twins' incubator in the air raid shelter. My twin brother and sister came as a surprise and, being so small needed the machine to help them breath. Sadly I thought of Mrs Goldby whose three strapping sons had been killed. Rather portly, she'd crawl upstairs and come down on her BTM as she'd call her bottom. Mum could hardly believe the news, with no flags, she grabbed a red shawl, grandad a blue shirt and, much to his annoyance, I held out his whitish "Long Johns". Screams of laughter followed from outside. I wished I could have gone into the woods and climbed trees with the boys watching celebrating couples on the grass below. I was told I was too young to learn of the intimacy between couples.....soon learned !

The late Margaret Peacock

When the end of the war was announced I was living in Weston Super Mare (where I was born). I was just 15 years old and still at school. It would have been exam time in May/June. Probably my mock exams for the school certificate which I took the following year.

I don't recall how I heard the war was over. Probably on the wireless as we had no telephone or television in those days.

I don't remember any street party in my road. We had been bombed with high explosive bombs in 1942 and 4/5 houses opposite our house were completely destroyed with a number of people killed. The girls part of my school was also partly destroyed by incendiary bombs and we had to share part of the boys building although we were not allowed to mix! We used the classrooms on one side of the quadrangle and they had the other.

My father was a cable telegraphist in a reserved occupation sending coded messages to the USA and the allies and worked shifts. He might well have been on night duty (as he was when we were bombed).

Sorry I can't remember more but I was so grateful it was all over.

By May of 1945, as a little girl, I had spent several years (and would spend a few more) in Mount Gould Orthopaedic hospital. May 8<sup>th</sup> was sunny and as usual on sunny days, the nurses pushed our beds out onto the veranda, overlooking the field below. No mean feat as most of us were encased in plaster and attached to metal frames ( no risk assessment then!). Sister Edgecombe ( our ward sister, a very scary lady) came out and told us the war was over. We did not know that some of it was not. What would it mean for me? It would mean that no longer when the siren was heard, I would be handed an enamel washing bowl to put on my head and pull the sheet up over the top of my bed. It is surprising, as a child, how safe you feel in those circumstances. It also meant that my dad, during raids, would not have to stand outside the hospital in the vain hope of getting me out if we were bombed. There had been a bomb, which hit the chest TB ward on another part of the site. Standing with dad were some wonderful folk who lived in the Astor estate opposite, ready to help evacuate patients in any way they were needed. Thank God I live to tell my story.

She is currently Plym District Appointments Secretary and Judy is also now very active with the running of Beavers at 1st Brixton and Yealmpton where she is also treasurer.



**Tina Johnson.** In the Devon County Scout Honours list this year Tina gained her twenty year service flash. All twenty years have been spent with 1<sup>st</sup> Elburton here at Elburton Methodist.

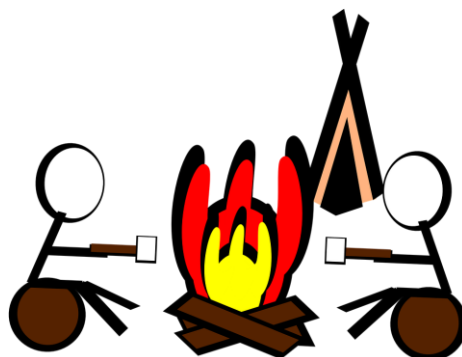

### **Elburton Methodist Women in Britain**

Whilst we are unable to meet, we are still keeping in touch with our weekly *At Home with Jesus*. These publications are kindly produced by Di Smart and contain prayers, bible readings, hymns and reflections. By Christmas, if my calculations are correct, there will have been almost 40 issues.

I'd like to share some District MWiB news with you.

As you may know, we have a 2 year MWiB District Project. This alternates between a 'home' charity and an overseas charity. Our recent home charity was **Air Ambulance**, for which our church and friends raised an incredible amount of money, mostly with donations for face masks. In early March, before the pandemic, the District MWiB had already decided that our next overseas charity would be the **Christian Hospital, Berhampur in India**. Fundraising for the hospital was planned to be launched at our Autumn District Day this year, which, along with most other events, was cancelled. The plans then were to launch it at the Spring 2021 District Day. However, at a District Zoom meeting in November, it was agreed that we should start fundraising for them ASAP.

A team from the District, consisting of Rev'd Graham Thompson, Rev'd Liz Singleton, Rev'd Stuart Innalls, Rev'd Deborah Kirk, Anne Browse and Shannon, a young lady with links to Plymouth Central Hall, visited the Cuttack Region of India in January 2020. The District supports this region financially and with prayer. They visited the Christian Hospital in Berhampur. Both Anne and Deborah Kirk, MWiB members, were very impressed by the wonderful work that is done there. Unfortunately, the hospital is in desperate need of financial help. However, with Covid restrictions, meetings and more normal fund raising events are not possible. There is an explanatory booklet (available for those with email) compiled by Graham Thompson, telling some of the history of the hospital and explaining the immediate need.

It is hoped that some people may be able to support this work by a one off donation, however small; every pound will be gratefully received and used well. Details of how you can donate are in the booklet. We will hopefully be able to get back to doing our 'normal' fundraising at Elburton next year once we are able to meet again, and profits from our Cream Tea afternoon and various Circuit events will then go to the hospital. However, I thought you might like to have some information now.



Due to the current restrictions, we were unable to have our usual Harvest Festival this year. Realising that the Plymouth Food Bank would miss out, arrangements were made to facilitate donations. The back and front doors were opened on two days, from 10am to noon, with folk there to accept gifts of food, cleansers, toiletries etc, as well as monetary donations. We were delighted that members of the community came with contributions, having read

the announcement of the event in the newspaper. As usual, EMC showed its always present generosity, as you can see from the photograph. Jeff and Janet kindly took all goods to the food bank where it weighed in at 322lbs. A cheque for £330 was sent by the treasurer from the collected money.

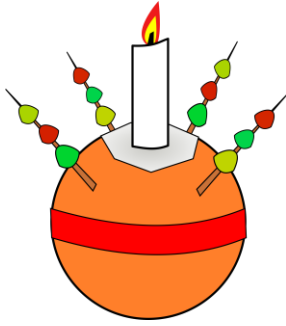
