Dear One and All,

Travelling is part of the Bible story and part of what it is to be a Christian, as we are all on a pilgrimage of faith-discovery. Travel they say broadens the mind; or travel is a curse according to Thenardier in Les Miserables. Either way it has an impact.

As I write this letter I am preparing to go on my travels. All the usual things from 'where's my passport?' to 'do you think this is sufficient socks?' There are times I think I could give Boots the Chemist a run for their money, as I seem to have medications to prevent anything from cold sores to Denge fever. It must be a left-over from being a boy scout, 'be prepared'.

Of course this turns my thinking to Jesus. The preparations for his earthly life come from ever lasting to everlasting, there being an eternal thread to Christ. His earthly life was formed in a family and when his ministry began, it was formed as he travelled. Grounded in prayer and with a group of fellow travellers, he missioned. The journeys Jesus took, though not over huge distances were still, in his day, perilous and arduous. As he travelled so he expounded the virtues and values of the Kingdom of God and what it meant to be a disciple of Jesus. He gave those who met with him a real foretaste of the Kingdom of God. Travelling with Christ was a demanding and yet enlightening experience.

Two thousand or so years later we are travelling with Jesus on a daily basis. We need to ask how we prepare ourselves for the journey. How we engage with Jesus on the way. What are our hopes, our expectations, our fears? As we travel, stop every so

often and take a look at the view and see how it changes as you journey on.

Be prepared for when the going gets tough and take a map! And finally ask yourself 'how is the journey changing me, from when I started until this precise moment'. Pause and reflect. How will this reflection affect the next part of your travels?







To my friends in Gateway:

As you will have seen from the prayer sheet there are several things to remember in this month of February. Yet there are a couple of things which are not mentioned there. The first is Valentine's Day. Saint Valentine officially Saint Valentine of Terni is widely recognised as a third-century Roman saint commemorated on February 14 and since the High Middle Ages is associated with a tradition of courtly love. All that is reliably known of the saint commemorated on February 14 is his name and that he was martyred and buried at a cemetery on the Via Flaminia close to the Ponte Milvio to the north of Rome on that day. It is uncertain whether St. Valentine is to be identified as one saint or the conflation of two saints of the same name. So states Wikipedia.

Shrove Tuesday (also known in other countries and Ireland as Pancake Tuesday or Pancake day) is the day in February or March immediately preceding Ash Wednesday (the first day of Lent), which is celebrated in some countries by consuming pancakes. In others, especially those where it is called Mardi Gras or some translation thereof, this is a carnival day, and also the last day of "fat eating" or "gorging" before the fasting period of Lent. This moveable feast is determined by Easter. The expression "Shrove Tuesday" comes from the word shrive, meaning "absolve". Shrove Tuesday is observed by many Christians, Including Anglicans, Lutherans, Methodists and Roman Catholics who make a special point of self-examination, of considering what wrongs they need to repent, and what amendments of life or areas of spiritual growth they especially need to ask God's help in dealing with." Being the last day of the liturgical season historically known as Shrovetide, before the penitential season of Lent, related popular practices, such as indulging in food that one sacrifices for the upcoming forty days, are associated with Shrove Tuesday

celebrations, before commencing the fasting and religious obligations associated with Lent. The term Mardi Gras is French for "Fat Tuesday", referring to the practice of the last night of eating richer, fatty foods before the ritual fasting of the Lenten season, which begins on Ash Wednesday. (Also thanks to Wikipedia.)

At my secondary school, which was Cooper's Company's School at that situated in Mile End, London, there was a special celebration of Pancake Day. The sixth and fifth formers would change into their old rugby shirts and shorts; the cook would bring in a large pancake and the headmaster would toss it into the main body of the hall which was reduced in size by the benches being moved into an arena. The ensuing melee would endeavour to get as much pancake as they could during the next five minutes egged on by shouts of the rest of the school. When the time has elapsed, the head blew his whistle and the combatants would flattened out their pieces of pancake and show them to the headmaster. He would then decide with the help of another master who had the largest amount. The person would be given an apprenticeship to the worshipful company of Coopers - something that was quite valuable in terms of money.

May you continue to know the presence of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ in your lives and remember that He loves **YOU** very much.

SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT

THOUGHTS FROM INDIA

When I tell people we went to India last summer, they imagine either the Golden Triangle or some exotic beach. Neither is true. We spent most of the time on the Ganges which is probably the filthiest river in the world. A rich lady realised that it would be possible to float a small cruise boat up the river when it was in spate during the monsoon season and she had one built. It still runs aground occasionally but was the only such boat on the Ganges so tourists were not expected and we had an unrivalled experience of rural Indian life as we visited villages. They photographed us as much as we them.

Firstly, we discovered that, though poor and living a hand-to-mouth existence sleeping in straw huts, and knowing that 54% of India does not have a toilet, we found most people had mobiles and quite a number had motorbikes. My concept of poverty had already been changed when I found the same in Ethiopia. Apparently there are 7 billion mobiles in the world and 37 million motorbikes in India alone.

Secondly, religion dominates peoples lives and seems to be a significant influence behind the economy. For example at the time of any festival, and there were plenty, everyone rich or poor must buy flowers. If they cannot afford flowers they buy leaves, and if that is beyond their means they buy grass.

There are far more people with an active religious faith in these poorer countries than in the UK. Most of India is Hindu (80%), although there is also Islam (14%), Christianity (2%), Sikhism (>2%), Buddhism (>1%) and Jainism (>1/2%). The Hindus worship many gods though in a sense they regard them all as part of one god. Shiva, Vishnu, Ganesha and Brahma are some of their principal gods but the river Ganges and all cows are also venerated. At the end of their lives many Hindus wish to return to the Ganges mud after a cremation on the banks of the river, and this is especially so at Varanasi where around 200 bodies are

cremated at pyres on the ghats (steps on the river banks) every day. Their ashes and charred bones are then swept into the river. If they died by snake-bite they are not burned but the body is launched into the river where it may be found floating downstream. Allegedly this is because they might not actually be dead, although personally I'd rather be burned while unconscious than wake just before I drowned in that foul water.

It is easy to smile at the beliefs of others as they swerve in their rickshaws and motorbikes around the cows on the streets knowing if they hit one they would instantly be mobbed by the masses who regard the animals as gods - but that is the problem. Seeing any religious activity as funny, unnecessary and quirky leads towards ostracising that religious person. Regarding other faiths as humorous and misguided is the first step towards separation by faith. This can lead eventually to vilification and conflict (although nobody's faith tells them they must hurt unbelievers) - but think Moslems and Hindus during the partition when two million died; think Buddhists and the Rohingya Moslems today (unofficial toll of at least 3,000 dead). Think honestly: if you had been born into a Moslem family would you not be a Moslem?

The fact is that we must each regard other faiths with the respect with which we wish our own to be regarded. We may well believe that nobody can come to the Father except through Christ but telling such people they are bound for Hell in a basket is far from an effective way to get alongside them. Treating them as misguided fools is simply arrogance on our part. Don't forget that we ourselves believe in much that others think stupid.

None of us knows who will and who will not earn the life eternal since we believe it is attained through God's grace rather than by exemplary behaviour, and it is surely not our place to second guess God. Only Christians know God as Father, and the God of love; (to a Moslem, "lover" is the 47th of 100 names they give Him) but the average Moslem seems to worship Him more fervently than many of us do.

Perhaps, if we get to heaven, we may be very surprised by who else is there.
