Letter for Elburton and Oreston

Dear One and All,

'The stairs don't meet the landing'



This week I have been in Durham University pursuing doctoral studies in theology and ethics. The comment above was made by a visiting lecturer and was a piece of home-spun philosophy offered by his Geordie mother. It is, in its own way, a shrewd piece of analysis of the human condition. If the stairs don't meet the landing, then there is a gap. The stairs in effect lead no where, even though they promise to take you somewhere. It puts me in mind of a traffic direction sign featured on our local television news, where the two signs on the signpost said on one arm 'somewhere' and on the other 'nowhere', leading to confusion and some amusement near a Somerset village.

The stairs not meeting the landing seems to describe where we are as a nation with Brexit. It is no wonder people are confused, exasperated, angry and anxious. There is an apparent gap between the referendum result and the mixed messages of those in government and parliament. The gap is not a good place to be for it is in that place that rumour, mischief and all kinds of skullduggery breed.

It is also appropriate for us to ask at the beginning of a new year how we match-up to the analysis as individuals and as a Church. As an individual, does our Christianity match the way we live our lives or is there a gap between the landing of the Christian life and the stairs of daily living, and if there is such a gap how is that to be remedied? If a gap appeared between the stairs in the Broad Room and the landing by the Moor Hall, we'd

soon have it fixed; however, the gap between Church and world is not so easily bridged.

Perhaps this year in our 150th year celebrations, we should mind the gaps so that we can have a safe landing.

150 Years part 1

Do you realise that this church began only 92 years after John Wesley died? He belived that the Anglican Church should serve criminals, alcoholics, and ordinary labourers - the sinners and ordinary folk of the world, not just the upper classes. Unable to change the church of that time, he began to preach to sinners in the open air and anywhere he could. Others followed his example including William O'Bryan with whom Wesley disagreed and had banned from the nascent Methodism. William worked in Devon and Cornwall where he began the Bible Christian Church, sometimes called the Bryanites. Elburton was one of the Bible Christian Churches founded as a result.

When John Wesley died he still claimed to be an Anglican priest though he had begun what became Methodism as we know it today. There was much dissention in the new church with half a dozen fragments being formed as people followed Wesley's example and began to preach outside of the traditional Church environment. It was as late as 1932 before the Primitive Methodists, the Weslyan Methodists and the group Bible Christians had already merged into called the United Methodists, joined together to form today's Methodist Church.

(Extract) News From Uganda



Dear Friends,

Our church has continued to grow, its hard to tell exactly but we believe the congregation to be around 1000 people. We have a busy church programme every week, with daily morning glory prayers, lunch hour services and three overnight prayer services every week. Our services are very African as you would expect, with loud, vibrant music, lots of dancing and singing that could lift the roof off. This year we have been blessed to see so many people giving their lives to Christ, so many miracles and so many lives being transformed. Our biggest problem is trying to keep up with all that God is doing in our midst!! Our pastoral staff team is small because there is no money to pay for extra pastors but we do our best and we have a band of wonderful ministers in the church who help us carry the load.

For years there has been a very well known witchdoctor on the outsirts of town who has gathered a huge following leading people to worship ancient demon spirits of Western Uganda. The churches in this area have been praying for the demise of this harmful and dangerous "ministry". This man has been known to Silas for several years. Recently Silas was able to visit him and miraculously lead him and his wife to Christ, glory be to God. It was totally amazing! After counselling they also agreed to get baptised - another incredible moment. They then requested to sanctify their marriage and get properly married before God at King of Kings which they did. It was a powerful testimony to all those whom they had been leading into witchcraft. Please pray that God gives us wisdom to know how to also lead their followers to Christ and we establish a church where there has been a shrine.

There are now 265 branch churches under King of Kings Ministries. It has been such a move of God! Training and equipping leaders has become an essential part of the ministry. One such student is Pastor Elly Splendor, he joined King of Kings 6 years ago. I recently visited them to consecrate the land where they plan to build a structure for the church and to officially commission them as pastors. It brings us so much joy to see our sons and daughters moving in to the destiny and calling on their lives.

With regards to our family here, Joan, who has been part of our family for the past eight years, completed her Diploma in Social Work and while she is looking for a job in that field, she is managing a salon in town. Our daughter Mercy has started University; she is studying for a Degree in Procurement. I know she would value your prayers, she has found the first semester quite challenging. Amanya (12), our other daughter, has just completed her Primary Leaving Exams and we are waiting for the results in January. We would also appreciate your prayers as we try to find the right secondary school for her. The majority of Ugandan secondary schools are boarding schools which we don't think is the right choice for Amanya so we are looking at the possibility of her attending an international day school in Kampala. This will be logistically difficult for us as a family and we don't have all the answers yet but we want to give Amanya the best opportunity to succeed in life.... Please pray for the right doors to open and for wisdom to make the right decisions.

Doreen has lived with us for the past three years and helps me run the house, is planning to get married early next year to a pastor and we are delighted for her. Please pray that we find a good replacement for her. We need someone that we can trust and fits in with the rest of this busy household!

For the first Link of the year, what better time to say THANK YOU to all our family and friends who have so faithfully stood with us financially,in prayer and with love and encouragement. You are amazing! You make what we do here in Uganda possible. We pray for you regularly and ask God to pour out His abundant blessings in your lives.



Don't judge a book by its cover - Christine Fitz

Recently a dear friend and the longest serving volunteer at the centre where I work (Plymouth Foodbank) died. Christine could be a little forthright; speaking her mind was something she was often known to do. She was often clumsy, her shopping trolley had scuff marks all over it. Her social skills were sometimes lacking, she frequently interrupted conversations abruptly. With all these human flaws, her hospital room was always full of visitors, even the nurses commented to me that they had never known any patient to have so many visitors. So why then does this clumsy, outspoken and sometime tactless lady get so many visitors? Christine also had cerebral palsy, all of the characteristics mentioned above were as a direct result of her condition. Christine worked in a bank, she was a filing clerk and was jolly good at it.

She qualified with an MA from the Open University with a degree in Psychology, she was a steadfast and faithful friend. She worshipped at three different churches, was a part of bible study groups, was involved in social groups and had volunteered at the centre since 1996, only ever missing weeks that she was on holiday. Christine travelled all over the world as a solo traveller, even going as far as Australia and America on her own, she was fearless except for one thing. She had a real dread that one day someone would judge her by her disability and she would end up in a nursing home. It is easy to look at someone and only see what is on the outside, and this was a great fear for Christine. However, she also knew that God did not see her as disabled, but His beautiful and gifted daughter, and Christine tried all her life to live up to that love that she experienced daily.

There are a lot of people who admired Christine, who will smile at her memory and will be happy that she is now whole and healed and with her Lord. She was a reminder to us that we should not judge a book by its cover but












Our Café Service December 23rd 2018

SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT

- "I just read the second chapter of John. Can you please explain it to me?" A friend asked the curate.
- "How deep do you want to go?"
- "I want the true meaning, that's all."
- "The trouble is, it isn't so simple. There are a number of meanings depending on how deep or superficial you want to go."
- "I just want you to explain it to me. Why is it there? " the friend persisted.
- "Well John is different from the other three gospels. It's written so that you can continually find new meanings in it."
- "I don't understand you. How can that happen? It's been around for two millennia now. What more is there to learn?"
- "Let me explain. What was Jesus' first event at the start of his ministry according to John?"
- "Turning water into wine, isn't it at the wedding? That's the one I've just read."
- "Why do you think John starts off with that?"
- "Because it's the first miracle that Jesus did?" the friend questioned with a hint of sarcasm, as though it was obvious.
- "Is it? Nobody else mentions it at all, yet about 70 years after Jesus was crucified he comes up with a story nobody else heard before."
- "So why do you think it's there?" the friend challenged.
- "I think it's there to state at the beginning of John's story what Jesus is about to do. How many vessels are standing in the courtyard?"
- "Six isn't it?"
- "And what does 6 mean in the Bible?"
- "No idea."
- "What does 7 mean, then?"
- "Seven? that's 'perfection' isn't it?"
- "Yes. It means 'perfect, complete'. You'll find it used almost 300 times times in the Bible. So now what do you think 6 means then?"
- "Don't know. Does it mean imperfect, incomplete?"
- "Exactly. Now can you remember what the 6 vessels were used for?"
- "It said they were used for religious rituals washing hands and feet."
- "So perhaps Jesus was trying to say that he had come because their

understanding of what God wants was imperfect, incomplete. He'd come to make it perfect."

- "Are you sure that's what it means?"
- "Your guess is as good as any other. How much wine did he make?"
- "I can work it out. He filled all six vessels with it and each held over 150 gallons or more. That's at least 900 gallons!"
- "That's about 1200 bottles worth. There would have been a lot left. What do you think the poor man did with it all?"
- "I don't know. It doesn't say."
- "What would you do with so much of the best wine you've ever tasted? "I'd keep it, drink it. Pass some to my friends."
- "I bet the guy who organised the wedding did the same, but remember he was not a rich man and those large vessels would cost perhaps more than he could afford to replace. Does he keep the new stuff or drain it away so he can use the vessels to wash peoples hands."
- "Keep it of course."
- "So the guy would replace the religious system of the time with what Jesus had given him. Isn't that exactly what Jesus came to do?"
- "I never looked at it like that before."
- "When you ask God for something, do you think he holds back? Is he reputed to be miserly in what you get?"
- "No, if he gives you something it's never miserly."
- "That's another message in that miracle. How bountiful can he be? 1200 bottles! There's another thing. Why do you think Jesus was so short with his Mum? She knew he could do it, but he said it wasn't his time."
- "Was it because he didn't want to start his ministry yet?"
- "I think you're right. It was Mary, his Mum who gave him the wake-up call. John is telling us that. Do you know John only gives us seven miracles (the perfect number again) and a lot of those are new ones not mentioned anywhere else. He calls them signs, not miracles. The sign is for us it's telling us that Mary started him doing the work he came to do, changing the faulted understanding of the time and replacing it with a perfect understanding if you are willing to see it, but it's hidden, you have to search for it. Think about it. We are told Jesus almost always spoke in parables John was just doing the same. That's why you can continually find new truths in his gospel, even today. Mine the gospel and see what else you can find. It's full of such discoveries."
