
Now there's a thought and you have all summer to ponder it.

PENTECOST

Pentecost was the celebration of the beginning of the early weeks of harvest. In Palestine there were two harvests each year. The early harvest came during the months of May and June; the final harvest came in the Autumn. According to the Old Testament, you would go to the day of the celebration of Firstfruits, and beginning with that day, you would count off 50 days. The fiftieth day would be the Day of Pentecost. So Firstfruits is the beginning of the barley harvest and Pentecost the celebration of the beginning of the wheat harvest. Since it was always 50 days after Firstfruits, and since 50 days equals seven weeks (?) it always came a "week of weeks" later. Therefore, they either called it the Feast of Harvest or the Feast of Weeks.

The account in Acts 2 reports that, after Jesus ascended into heaven, Jesus' followers were gathered together for the Feast of Harvest (aka Pentecost), and the Holy Spirit *"filled the whole house where they were sitting"*. *"All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them"*. This strange occurrence drew a large crowd, and Peter stood up to speak to them about repentance and the gospel of Christ. The Church grew by 3,000 people. This is why Christians still celebrate Pentecost.

MEMORIES FROM BARBARA

I first went to Elburton Methodist in 1947 for a piano lesson with Mr Salter, the organist who also taught piano. When we moved to Elburton in 1951, my Grandad who was blind after an accident at Moore's quarry, asked me to take him to the morning service at the chapel, which I did. When I first went, the main door was to the left, where the fire exit is now and at the top in the centre was the organ with a screen in front of it.

In 1951 we entered via a gate to the door in its present position, the entrance was as it is now. The vestry was on the left. In the church, an aisle was on each side of benches in the middle facing the organ. The choir seats were at the right of the organ. There was a pulpit on the left hand side.

I attended morning and evening services and afternoon Sunday School.

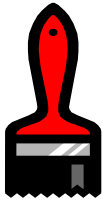

June Dinner and Jenny Weymouth

It has been a blessing to my sister, Jenny and myself to have been a part of Elburton Methodist for 80 years. We were actually Christened at St Matthews at the insistence of our maternal grandmother. It must have been a great sadness to our mother who had been a part of Elburton Methodist and a choir member from the 1920's.

Our earliest recollections are of the war years when the church opened its doors to provide a canteen for servicemen and offer a quiet place to write letters. Our mother was one of a team of ladies who entertained the men (in the nicest possible way!) We recall summer evenings swimming at Brixton Tor and enjoying the sing-alongs with a guitar playing soldier.

In the early days we attended Sunday School in the afternoons. Each child was given a card on entering and these were stamped with a gold star by Miss Frances Moore, the number of stars at the end of the year determined whether you were eligible for a prize at the annual prize-giving. We remember Sunday School outings, catching a train from Elburton station to Yealmton where we played games in a field and enjoyed an alfresco tea party. (It never rained!). On the return journey each child was presented with a 'goodie bag' before boarding the train.

We became Sunday School teachers in the 1950's. This is where I met Clive who was a Sunday School teacher, before his National Service, and we married in 1958. Jenny and I retired in the 1980's and then, like our parents, held various offices over the years, richly blessed by the fellowship at Elburton.

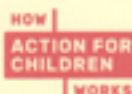

SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT

"Absolute nonsense!" the woman fumed. "Ever since she was born we've both worked full time so we could give her anything she wanted - and it's always been the best - not rubbish!" she changed her tone. "Look! The priest down the road would tell her she's sinning. Why won't you?"

"How can any of us see the sawdust in her eye, when we have lumps of wood in our own? Look at the model that Jesus gave us. He said 'Let the person who is without sin throw the first stone.'"
