# Letter for Elburton and Oreston



Dear One and All,

It's not as though I am a Christmas grinch, though my family say I am, so I must be; it's simply I prefer the Easter season and the whole run up to it through Lent. Why so? It probably stems from the thoughtfulness of Lent, its demands and a fresh look every year at the inward journey to what has been described by Teresa of Avila as our 'interior castle'. An interior castle in which we hide, defending ourselves from the outside world, building ramparts to defend us from scrutiny. Setting our defences lest anyone should really know what we are like.

The interior castle sets all kinds of images going inside of me. My imagination runs riot. A castle is a powerful thing. If you've ever looked at Harlech castle or Windsor castle you'll know what I mean. The Tower of London was built to be impregnable. A castle admits only those who are deemed friendly, others are kept out. Sometimes I find I do exactly that, keep people out so that I might not risk being hurt or damaged, perhaps you do the same. Up goes the draw bridge, defences on alert!

The Jesuit priest Gerry Hughes, sadly now dead but gone to glory, was one who struggled with the interior castle, but was content to share his struggles with others. His writings such as Lent: A Journey for Battered Pilgrims and God of Surprises speak of his spiritual experiences and journeys. His books such as Walk to Jerusalem speak not only of a physical journey and all the effort it takes, but also of the depths of pilgrimage and life seen as a pilgrimage. Hard going, but the end is good. In our pilgrimage of life, we have to accept the friendship of others

and reveal ourselves, it's a risk, but so is the journey.

For me too it is wrapped-up in my liking for liturgy. I find the ashing ceremony at our Ash Wednesday service profoundly moving, as indeed I find the words of the Maundy Thursday service so solemn and yet vital. Our Sunday by Sunday dressing of the cross and accompanying words are powerful statements of faith. Holy Week is emotional, sapping, up-lifting, terrifying, ultimately sublime.

And then Easter. Oh joy! A service at Jennycliffe overlooking Plymouth Sound and then the church family gathered at EMC; we celebrate. Finally at the end of the day, prayer, thankfulness and a peaceful celebration of the Lord's supper. These are precious, sacred, holy things and that's really why the Lent and Easter season speaks to me more clearly and at greater depth.







# 150 Years part 2



The Bible Christian Churches (of which Elburton was one) were not established directly by John Wesley. William O'Bryan was the founder. William was born in Gunwen 23 miles west of Plymouth and intellectually was quite brilliant. He was initially licensed as a Weslyan local preacher and content to work on the Bodmin circuit. He was courteous, had significant charisma and possesed a fervent godliness that made him popular. It was his plunging into remote areas of Cornwall that Wesley considered dangerous а irregularity, that and his being

married with 8 children which meant extra expenses. He split from the Weslyan Methodist Church in 1815. He left the Bible Christians in 1832 after a dispute. In 1835 he emigrated to New York.

The church enjoyed prosperity in his absence with successful missions in the USA, Canada, Australia and New Zealand and establishing three publishing houses and a college at Shebbear. The high point was 1882 when there were 300 ministers in Britain and 34,000 members. At that point discussions began with The Wesleyan Methodists and the Primitive Methodists. In 1907 a number of fragments were brought together to form the United Methodist Church but the final merger with the Primitives and remaining Wesleyans was not untl 1932.

### What happened to the Apostles?

There is much oral tradition and legend around the deaths of the Apostles. Only John died of natural causes in old age. Many reports emphasised the grusomeness to inspire courage in Christians. Let the sensitive be warned!

- 1. Simon Peter was crucified upside down (his choice) in Rome.
- 2. Andrew reached Asia Minor, What is now the Soviet Union, Greece and Turkey before being crucified on an X shaped cross for converting the wife of a Greek official.
- 3. James the son of Zebedee was put to the sword by Herod Agrippa. Acts 12:2
- 4. John (brother of James) travelled to Ephesus and Patmos, and was the only Apostle to die naturally at the age of 100.
- 5. Philip visited North Africa and Asia Minor before being crucified in Turkey for converting the wife of the Roman proconsul.
- 6. Bartholomew saw India, Ethiopia and Arabia before apparently being skinned alive in Armenia.
- 7. Thomas visited Syria. He was tortured with red hot plates in India before dying from 4 spears thrown by soldiers.
- 8. Matthew the Tax Collector worked in Persia and Ethiopia before being stabbed by cannibals as he took Communion.
- 9. James son of Alphaeus taught in Syria where he was eventually thrown from the temple, then stoned and clubbed to death.
- 10. Thaddaeus died in Beirut, killed with a battle axe.
- 11. Simon the Zealot worked in Persia before being cut to pieces for not sacrificing to the sun god.
- 12. Judas Iscariot either committed suicide by hanging or his bowels burst open depending if you read Matthew 27:5 or Acts 1:18
- 13. Matthias (Judas' replacement) was eventually burnt at the stake after working in Ethiopia and Syria.
- 14. Paul was not truly an Apostle. The Bible does not tell us but it is understood that he was beheaded by Nero.

### **ELBURTON SCHOOL ASSEMBLY TUESDAY 12th FEB**

### **'19**

B Good morning everyone. My name is Brenda. Put your hand up if you like reading. What kind of stories do you like to read?

(Answers from 2 or 3)

I love books that take you back in history and you can find out how people lived long ago. I wonder if we could try to go back in history today. Shall we try? Let's wish hard, close eyes and say "Please take us back in time." (Children repeat) Has anything happened? O dear, we're still all the same. But wait . . . who's this? (Tracey enters in costume looking puzzled)

- T Where am I. How did I get here?
- B You've arrived at Elburton School. Welcome!
- I was just reading my book! (Looks around) What a lot of children! They are wearing very strange clothes and they are all mixed up! Why are the girls not sitting on their own, what would their mothers' think? And they have no aprons or caps! What year is this?
- B It is 2019. Can you please tell us your name and where you come from?
- T My name is Mrs Mary Thorne and I live in Plymouth but I spend a lot of time in Elburton. Did you say it was 2019? It can't be, it is now 1869 and Queen Victoria is

- on the throne.
- B We now have Queen Elizabeth as our monarch. How did you get to Elburton?
- T O, several ways. I sometimes walk all the way, or I can come on a horse and cart or a donkey cart. That's a bit bumpy and uncomfortable.
- B And why do you come all the way here, that's a long journey?
- T I'm a preacher for the Bible Christians. We follow the way of Mr John Wesley and want to tell everyone to trust in the Lord Jesus. Brother John Hendy runs the Sunday School for the children.
- B (To the children) <u>How do you get to Plymouth?</u> (Bus, car, etc.)
- T What are cars and buses?
- B They are like your carriages but instead of having a horse to pull it, they have an engine. A bus can carry up to 50 passengers.
- T That's amazing!
- B What was Elburton like in Victorian times?
- T Very muddy! The horses and carts make the road very rough.
- B Were there many houses?
- T A few cottages, some with earth floors. There is now a new chapel which was built on the ground where some old cottages stood.
- B What do the children do in Elburton?
- The good children help their parents in the home or on the farm. They feed the animals and lead the horses.

The girls learn to cook and clean and sew, they help to make butter and cheese and how to bake bread.

- B They sound very busy! Do they have time to play?
- T If they have done all their jobs they may be able to play some games
- B I think we have some pictures of what it was like in your time. These are some children playing with hoops and sticks.(Show slides and make comments on one of them.)
- T That was very interesting.
- B It was nice to see the field. Most of Elburton is now covered with houses.
- That is a shame. There are ten farms around here and lots of people work on a farm. Sadly there is still not enough work for everyone and some of our young men are leaving our country to travel thousands of miles to go to America or Australia! They hope to make their fortunes there. Before the new chapel was built we used to meet for services in one of the old barns it was rather draughty.
- B I believe there was a blacksmith here for many years run by the Coleman family.
- T Yes, I love to watch the horses having new shoes fitted, and watch the strong blacksmith.
- B Do you have time to take a holiday? The children have long holidays in the summer, and some of them even fly to foreign countries in planes.
- T I have so much work to do, I don't have time for

- holidays but did you say the children "flew"? How on earth do they do that? What is a plane?
- B Children can you tell Mary what a plane looks like?
- T We do have railway engines that pull carriages and they go very fast! They have not come to Elburton yet but I expect they will one day.
- B Yes, I think they came here in 1888, we still have a road called Station Road, but there are no trains there now.
- I must get back now as it will soon be dark and I want to get the candles lit and the oil lamp going so that I can continue reading.
- B We are sorry to have called you away, but thank you for coming, we have learnt so much. Good-bye. (Mrs Thorne leaves)
- B That was make-believe but it was fun.
- T We wanted to tell you about the old time Elburton because the Methodist Church up the road is still here and has its 150<sup>th</sup> birthday this year
- B It would be lovely if some of you could make a drawing about some of the things you have heard. We could put them in our exhibition later in the year. Some of the boys and girls here go to Brownies and Cubs and you could ask them to bring the pictures to church
- T&B A big thank-you to all!

You may wish to love and praise God, to confess your faults and omissions, to express your thanks, to address your concerns and needs, (supplication), or to pray for others (intercession). Whatever most concerns you will probably concern others. Obviously don't make it too specifically personal because it will be read by many others, and don't mention names without making sure from the person concerned that it would cause no offence. Only sign your own name at the end if you are happy for it to appear in the book. 50 - 200 words is the target but more or less is OK. Please think about writing your own prayer and give it to Tony Raine or Brenda Youngs. The book will be on sale and will be a lovely reminder of our 150 years celebration long after it is over.

### AFRICAN PALM CROSSES

The African Palms project was started in 1965 by Fr Alan Talbot an Anglican priest who served for 6 years as a missionary in the diocese of Masasi Tanzania. His aim was to give really poor villagers the means to earn some extra money to supplement their meagre income.

The Palm Crosses are made from

dried branches of the dwarf palm Hyphaena coriacia. These grow wild in the Masasi area, so are not cultivated, furthermore no trees are cut down in the work of collecting the Palm Leaves for plaiting the Palm Crosses. The work of making the Palm Crosses does not interfere with the villagers' normal work of producing the food they need to live, it provides some additional income. The crosses are sent once a year to the UK where they are sorted and packed. Any profit is used for health and education projects in

the Masasi area.





Fr Alan Talbot died last August at the age of 95, leaving behind a very successful project that now makes 3 million crosses that are sold worldwide each year.

Now, every Palm Sunday, a week before Easter, our church gives everyone a palm cross to remind them of Jesus being celebrated by the crowds just before he was crucified.


## THE INTERCHURCH BIBLE STUDY GROUP



### **Dear Friends**

I write this after our Sunday dinner of salmon cutlet, Brussel sprouts and potatoes followed by fruit salad and ice cream. So there's every chance that I might doze off whilst I write!! This morning I was preaching at Millbrook Methodist Church and used the chain car ferry. I'm back to Torpoint tomorrow to visit a family preceding a funeral service. Last month I was the last car off the ferry at Plymouth, today I was the fourth car, you never can tell!

I forgot to mention St Valentine in last month's newsletter. For the past fifty-six years I have sent Brenda a valentine card, just reminding her how precious she is to me. St Valentine, officially St Valentine of Rome, was a widely recognised third century saint commemorated on the 14<sup>th</sup> of February and since the Middle Ages is associated with a tradition of courtly love! He died on the 14<sup>th</sup> February 269 in Rome.

This month we enter into the season of Lent beginning with Ash Wednesday preceded by Shrove Tuesday. That day at my school was a special event day. (Forgive me if I have told some of you about it). My secondary school was a boys' school in Tredegar Square, Bow, London. For a Methodist it might have the wrong connotation seeing that we don't drink alcohol! On Shrove Tuesday the sixth form and any fifth form school leavers would put on their old rugby shorts and vests and gather in the school hall. The building had an upper floor and the rest of the school would gather round the surrounding balcony.

At eleven o'clock. The headmaster would come on stage with a frying pan in his hand which contained a pancake. He would

then toss the pancake into the hall before him and over the next ten minutes those on the floor would endeavour to get as much pancake into their hands as possible. The head would blow his whistle and each participant would flatten out their pancake gains and the head would decide who had the largest amount. That person would then be awarded an apprenticeship to the honourable company of Coopers (barrel makers). It was a prize worth having, I can assure you.

Shrove Tuesday gets its name from the custom for Christians to be "shriven" before the start of Lent. Traditionally, Anglo-Saxon Christians would go to church to confession and be absolved from their sins on this day. The word shrove is a form of the English word shrive, which means to obtain absolution for one's sins by way of confession and penance. The verb to shrive describes the act of hearing a confession, often by a priest. Traditionally, pancakes were eaten on this day to use up rich, indulgent foods like eggs and milk before the fasting season (47 days) of Lent began.

### SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT

#### THE CURATE AND THE FRIEND Part 2

"Do numbers in the Bible always have significance like that?" the friend asked of the curate who had been explaining the meaning of the miracle of Jesus turning water into wine.

"Usually yes," the curate answered. "You have to remember that using numbers like that was a standard part of the Jewish story-telling culture and that everyone knew what they meant. It wouldn't have been the mystery that it is to us today."

"How about the feeding of the five thousand?"

"That one is very typical of John. Five, incidentally, represents God's grace. The five loaves and two fish came from a boy, John is the only one to tell us that. From the most inferior, a mere boy, comes the gift of everything that the boy could give and Jesus turned it into more than sufficient to feed everyone. Can you see a moral or two there?"

Rather than look for a moral, the friend instead queried, "I thought girls were the most inferior in Bible times, not boys?

"A girl would have been effectively invisible. Yes women and girls were there following their men but they weren't even counted among the 5,000. Sorry, I'm not the misogynist here. It was the wrong-thinking prevalent at the time, Women were just possessions." explained the curate apologetically.

"It says even the number of waste baskets was actually counted. Why on earth did they do that?"

"There is no superfluous detail in John. Everything means something. It's significant that the word used for those baskets refers to the wicker baskets that Jews used,"

"Why does it say there were 12 baskets?" the friend persisted.

"What does twelve mean?" countered the curate.

"You're on about numbers again, aren't you? There were 12 disciples, weren't there?"

"And there was a reason for that, too. There were 12 tribes of Israel. That's possibly why 12 leaders of those tribes, twelve

apostles, were chosen - all men because they wouldn't follow a woman then."

"And you think twelve baskets of leftovers means there was enough left for all twelve tribes."

"Exactly - the whole of Israel. That was everybody in the world who believed in the God of Abraham."

"Hang on. Matthew tells us that it happened twice, doesn't he, and the other time there were 4000 men eating and seven baskets collected."

"Why do you think that was?" asked the curate with a smile.

"Don't have the vaguest idea."


"There's a clue in the word used for the basket. In that case it's a different Greek word that refers to a different kind of basket used by the non-Jewish Greeks. It happened near Decapolis, which means ten Greek cities. They possibly wouldn't have understood the significance of twelve because they were not of the Jewish culture. The Greek Pythagoreans believed that the number seven pointed symbolically to the union of the Deity with the universe. Seven was regarded as having sacred power. Seven would mean perfect to them and suggests enough for all."

"That's beginning to sound a bit far-fetched." said the friend.

"You think so? Read Matthew 16:9-11, where Jesus underlines the issue."

"You know, I'm not sure I believe the story at all," the friend admitted.

"No? It's in all four of our gospels. People in those days, knowing they would be travelling and unsure of how far or how long, would almost certainly take food with them. How else did all those baskets get there? Nobody would want to reveal their food first in case they had to share. Jesus showed no such inhibition with his food and led the others to do the same. If that were true, which is the greater miracle: getting 5000 people to share, or multiplying bread and fish?"
