Letter for Elburton and Oreston

Dear One and all,



'What's your agenda?'

It's a modern way of asking 'what do you really want?' And yet there's somehow a sub-text, almost accusative, in its questioning; as if one is employed in a subterfuge and not being quite transparent. I am coming to the view mostly our 'agendas' don't work when it comes to the Methodist Church. The 1990's had the Decade of Evangelism as its agenda. By and large it was a flop. The Methodist Church is re-launching 'Our Calling' as a means, in part, of addressing Methodist Church decline; let's hope it has some renewed traction. In the last 24 years of my ministry, despite many programmes, agendas, missions, strategies, reforms and the expenditure of huge amounts of energy, the result in terms of the Methodist Church is, we are where we are. Perhaps I should be downhearted or depressed, disillusioned or dismayed and yet I am not; in fact I am quite hopeful. Why?

- 1: For myself I am looking to God, through Christ, to set the agenda now. This means taking a risk and handing over control; saying Lord, it's your Church, I'll play my part but I want your will to come first and therefore, accepting the words of the hymn, 'lead us heavenly Father lead us'. Not easy when I have a tendency to be controlling.
- 2: To engage more deeply in discerning God's will through prayer and reflection. This means asking the Holy Spirit to pour out the Spirit's wisdom, to spend more time in studying God's Word and sharing the fruits of such study. There is something prophetic in this calling and it's a voice which needs exploring. It is also about living-out the sacrament in daily living.

3: To stop running around like a mad thing, being engaged with 'stuff', rather than what Mr Wesley said 'to spend and be spent in the salvation of souls'. This is what is quaintly called 'the care of souls'. It's at the very heart of ministry. Indeed, it's time prayerfully to ask 'what are ministers for and what does the Church want them to do?'

This is something which I feel needs 'testing' and I ask you to help me discern where Christ is calling His Church. Our 150th Year should be a good vehicle for exploring this.

I hope the summer has refreshed you.

ABOUT THE LINK

It has been reckoned that publishing the Link this year will have cost our church in the order of £1,000. This is after some readers have paid generously towards it and the advertising revenue has been added in. While it is accepted that it is an excellent outreach and very useful within the church, it is still difficult to justify an outlay of such a large sum.

The on-line version of the Link is actually superior in many respects. I have sometimes added corrections in it after putting it up as things change, making it more dependable, and it is in colour throughout which greatly enhances the readability. The text can also be adjusted to whatever size suits the reader's eyes. What's more, the on-line copy has no significant cost whatever. The figures for how many hits the Link receives are surprising - 600 people have looked at the Summer Link so far, 1,000 for the one before that and eventually tens of thousands for some of the older issues.

Good reasons to keep it are that many of our readers will not have a computer and so will be unable to read the web Link. Some Links are passed on to other people so they have multiple readers.

It has been decided that we will continue producing the Link in both formats, on-line and on paper, but that the paper one which incurs a printing cost must carry a charge. I realise that very many of you already pay for it and also that some will no longer take it if a charge is made. We ask readers of the paper version to pay what they can with a suggestion of £1. Perhaps Pastoral Leaders who disperse them would discuss it with the recipients and pass on any money they receive to the Treasurer, Bob Faulkner in an envelope marked 'for the Link'. We will still provide local surgeries and some shops with free copies to continue the outreach.

I know that most of you give money already and will understand that the church cannot easily afford to continue the outlay. I also expect that we will produce fewer copies as some switch over to the on-line version. Whatever happens, the Link will continue. AR

DATA PRIVACY NOTICE

Elburton, Pomphlett, Oreston and Gateway Methodist Churches

1. Your personal data – what is it?

Personal data relates to a living individual who can be identified from that data. Identification can be by the information alone or in conjunction with any other information in the data controller's possession or likely to come into such possession. The processing of personal data is governed by the General Data Protection Regulation (EU) 2016/679 (the "GDPR").

2. Who are we?

The **Methodist Church in Great Britain** is a membership church made up of different bodies of Managing Trustees. Trustees for Methodist Church Purposes (TMCP) is the controller and responsible for general data protection issues arising in respect of day to day matters in relation to how your personal data is processed and for what purposes. If you have any questions about this privacy notice, including any requests to exercise your legal rights, please contact the Superintendent Minister (details below).

3. How do we process your personal data?

Elburton, Pomphlett, Oreston and Gateway Methodist Churches comply with their obligations under the" GDPR" by keeping personal data up to date; by storing and destroying it securely; by not collecting or retaining excessive amounts of data; by protecting data from loss, misuse, unauthorised access and disclosure and by ensuring that appropriate technical measures are in place to protect personal data. Each individual church uses your personal data for the following purposes: -

- To administer membership records;
- To fundraise and promote the interests of each church;
- To comply with legal or regulatory obligations that each is subject to (including Safeguarding and DBS checks);
- To manage, where applicable, employees and volunteers;
- To maintain each Church's accounts and records (including the processing of gift aid applications).
- To protect your vital interests e.g. in an emergency life or death situation where the emergency services are called to treat you when you are with us.

- To inform you of news, events, activities and services at each of the churches.
- To share your contact details with the Methodist Circuit and District so they can keep you informed about news, events, activities and services that will be occurring and in which you may be interested.

4. What is the legal basis for processing your personal data?

- Explicit consent of the data subject so that we can keep you informed about news, events, activities and services;
- Processing is necessary for carrying out legal obligations in relation to Gift Aid or under employment, social security or social protection law, or a collective agreement;
- Processing is carried out by a not-for-profit body with a political, philosophical, religious or trade union aim provided: the processing relates only to members or former members (or those who have regular contact with it in connection with those purposes); and there is no disclosure to a third party without consent.

5. Sharing your personal data

Your personal data will be treated as strictly confidential and will only be shared with other members of the church in order to carry out a service to other church members or for purposes connected with the church. We will only share your data with third parties outside the church with your consent.

6. How long do we keep your personal data?

We will only retain your personal data for as long as necessary to fulfil the purposes we collected it for, including for the purposes of satisfying any legal, accounting or reporting requirements.

Full details of retention periods for data processed by the Methodist Church of Great Britain can be found on the Methodist Church website at: http://www.methodist.org.uk/for-ministers-and-office-holders/office-holders/office-holders/

Specifically, church membership data while it is still current; children's and young people's data only for the duration of attendance at groups and activities, unless they are children of church members; gift aid declarations and associated paper work for up to 6 years after the calendar year to which they relate; and registers (baptisms, marriages) permanently.

7. Your rights and your personal data

Unless subject to an exemption under the "GDPR", you have the following rights with respect to your personal data: -

- The right to request a copy of your personal data which is held by Elburton, Pomphlett, Oreston or Gateway Methodist Church;
- The right to request that Elburton, Pomphlett, Oreston and Gateway Methodist Church corrects any personal data if it is found to be inaccurate or out of date;
- The right to request your personal data is erased where it is no longer necessary for Elburton, Pomphlett, Oreston or Gateway Methodist Church to retain such data;
- The right to request your consent to the processing at any time;
- The right to request that the data controller provides the data subject with his/her personal data and where possible, to transmit that data directly to another data controller, (known as the right to data portability);
- The right, where there is a dispute in relation to the accuracy or processing of your personal data, to request a restriction is placed on further processing;
- The right to object to the processing of personal data;
- The right to lodge a complaint with the Information Commissioners Office (see below).

8. Further processing

If we wish to use your personal data for a new purpose, not covered by this Data Protection Notice, then we will provide you with a new notice explaining this new use prior to commencing the processing and setting out the relevant purpose and processing conditions. Where and whenever necessary, we will seek your prior consent to the new processing.







"Our Savannah was never selfish," Emily argued.

"All right then, she was self-centred if you prefer the term. Good sacrificial parenting is usually instinctive and vital to a human child's development. It is only from the example of loving parents or parent substitutes that our children can learn to love. Lower animals do not show sacrificial love to those outside their family."
